Angela has had an interest in women's health issues for several years, particularly issues facing women in isolated and developing regions and those from marginalized groups. For this reason, she completed a B Sc (Med) in 2003 (gaining First Class Honours) and undertook, through the Centre for Health Equity Training Research and Evaluation, a comparative study of the role of socio-economic status and Aboriginality in birth outcomes of women and infants in an outer metropolitan area —an invaluable experience to work closely with the local Aboriginal Home Visiting team and Health Workers.

Having deferred Medicine in 2005 when she took on work in an Aboriginal community west of Alice Springs, Angela will be undertaking her final year in 2007, as well as studying for a Master of Public Health at UNSW (part-time). Included in her Master's studies has been a course: "Gender and Health: Implementing Best Practice in Reproductive and Sexual Health in South East Asia and the Pacific".

Additional to her commitment to studies, Angela has found time to involve herself in the Rural Allied Health and Medical Society (RAHMS) since 2000 and, in 2006, was co-Chair of the National Rural Health Network (NRHN). In her final year medicine, she will have elective placements in clinics in the Northern Territory and Western Australia, where she will gain valuable experience in primary health care and reproductive health. In the clinic in WA, at One Arm Point, she will be helping to implement a new sexual health program for adolescents.

She has worked with the Eurobodalla Mental Health Team and has also gained experience working with, engaging and being responsible for 38 adolescent girls at a female boarding house where she was overnight supervisor. She takes up a challenging position this year assisting individuals with their transition back to the community after a psychiatric hospital admission.

Kathleen feels her work experiences have taught her the importance of human interaction and the need to provide assistance and support to disadvantaged groups. It has also reinforced her belief in the need for social justice and the acceptance and respect for diverse groups.

Concurrently, however, Jocelyn studied from 2001-2004 to gain a Diploma of Arts (specializing in Music) from the University of Sydney. This led her to enter a Master of Music at the University of Missouri at Kansas City where she gave a Recital at its Grant Hall before transferring to Sydney in 2006 to continue her Master's study.

At the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, Jocelyn is a student of Gerard Willems. Later this year, she has been offered the opportunity of having lessons with the prestigious pianist and pedagogue Lorin Hollander in the USA. A performance with an orchestra is likely to be included in this visit. Offers to perform in Hong Kong are also under consideration. The award will assist Jocelyn in broadening her musical experiences.

The following year, Louise was admitted as a candidate for the degree of Master of Laws (Research) at USYD, successfully upgrading to become a PhD candidate in 2005. Her current research is entitled "Cosmetic Surgery and the Law of Negligence: An Infectious Passion for Beauty?". Her thesis will emphasise the need for further governance and legal reform of the cosmetic surgery industry in Australia.
